I look forward to learning more about environmentally friendly gardening – especially weed control.







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
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Annual awards were also presented at the March meeting, including some well deserved awards for our club... I think I may have missed some, but here's what I

caught and captured!









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



"Having served as your President these past four years, I am honored, humbled and grateful for the experience I've enjoyed as the leader of this extraordinary club. As your new District I Director, I am so pleased to conduct my first officer installation for my own club!

NGC's Attributes of Design include Beauty, Distinction, Expression and Harmony. The Dorchester Garden Club is, itself, a work of design excellence as expressed by these attributes and they are exhibited in so many ways.

In keeping with the theme for this next administration—Back to Basics—our new officers will lead our garden club reflecting the Principles and Elements of Design.

The Elements of Design are the basic, tangible and/or visible qualities of all art and include Color, Pattern, Form, Size, Light, Space, Line and Texture. The Principles of Design are the basic standards used to judge all visual art. Their correct application is necessary for a well-executed design. They include Balance, Contrast, Dominance, Proportion, Rhythm and Scale. I am confident these officers will continue to create the well-executed design that is DGC based on these important principles and elements.

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Barbara Massetti, as Treasurer, you are tasked with fiscal responsibility. The Treasurer is custodian of all Club funds and keeps an account of all receipts and disbursements as budgeted and approved by the club. When you balance the budget and it is declared stable, your work reflects the principle of Balance. These flowers bring to mind important qualities of a Treasurer—Allium is indicative of Prosperity, Cabbage implies Profit, White Chrysanthemum-Truth and Daffodil-Honesty.

Linda Chandlee, as you continue in your role as Corresponding Secretary your efforts reflect Proportion. The principle of proportion is defined as a ratio between areas and amounts to the whole. You reach out to our members in their times of need or struggle with a proportionate response on behalf of the members of our Club, whether an expression of get well, sympathy or 'thinking of you.' These flowers represent important qualities in a corresponding secretary— Chervil/Fern means Sincerity, a Pear Blossom represents Comfort and Yellow Pansy literally means thinking of you.

Lynne Davis and Dee Terry, as you share the responsibility of fulfilling the duties of Recording Secretary, you are like the principle of Rhythm. In a design, rhythm is achieved by having a dominant visual path of line or of color throughout the design, making it appear alive. With your detailed records/minutes of what actions have been taken—the when, where, what and why of each meeting, you keep our interest and purpose alive. The iris is considered a message and Rosemary and the Gladiolus-represent remembrance. So try and remember everything pertinent that happens and send us a message with your minutes.

As Vice President, *Cheryl Willey*, you provide visual stability to our club through the principle of Contrast and the elements of Color and Pattern. You stand in support of our president, ready to step in to lead as needed, but will best serve him and our members by freely expressing contrasting views and enhancing our 'design' through your colorful enthusiasm and energic patterns of action. Angelica represents Inspiration—something you will give to our President at every turn; your support will be constant and the Blue Hyacinth represents Constancy. Thyme represents Activity and bouvardia enthusiasm—and you are most certainly a bundle of that.



Equal amounts of contrasting textures, colors or forms serve only to divide attention, destroying dominance. You achieve the principle of dominance in your office as President by managing all the workings of the club and by controlling the direction of club in keeping with our vision and mission. You are wished good luck as symbolized by Bells of Ireland; new beginnings and appreciation represented by the daffodil; fortune, devotion & friendship reflected by the alstromeria.

What is so remarkable is when you put them all together, creating a beautiful design based on the attributes, principles and elements, the club thus becomes reflective of design excellence.
